

SCHOOL BUS SAFETY TIPS

SCHOOL BUSES CARRY PRECIOUS CARGO

As drivers, you carry the responsibility for making sure that school bus travel remains a safe way for children to travel.

School buses and school bus drivers are the most regulated vehicles and drivers in the province. You are responsible for maintenance of your bus equipment, passenger safety and control plus safe and timely passage on the roads.

THREE PRINCIPLES GOVERN SCHOOL BUS SAFETY

1. Safety
2. Order
3. Respect

Every day, before taking a school bus onto the road, and while driving, you are responsible for making sure that the bus is in safe operating condition. You are required to do the following:

- 16 point outside inspection
- 28 point inside inspection

Information on any defects must be recorded in the log book and repaired promptly.

BEFORE PROCEEDING, YOU MUST ALSO:

- Check that the driver's seat belt is correctly worn and fastened.
- Drive forward and brake to a stop to test the service brake.
- Make an additional check of all gauges.
- Complete the log book entry.

At the end of the bus run, do a physical check to make sure that all passengers have left the bus.

As a driver, you are responsible for the physical and emotional safety of the children who ride on your bus. Each child must be confident that the bus is a safe place. To ensure this, you must maintain order and control.

Everyone on the school bus - drivers and passengers alike - must respect the rights of others.

PLAN A SAFE ROUTE

When route layouts are being planned, the safety of the children is the first consideration. The location and accessibility of a school bus stop is important.

- Ensure that bus stops are accessible in all kind of weather.
- Ensure safe walking routes between homes and bus stops.
- Do not load passengers on a steep grade or curve.
- Avoid using bus stops at intersections with traffic signals.
- Minimize the number of street crossings that children have to make getting to and from the bus.
- Make sure that bus stops are free from hazard.

QUICK FACTS



1. There are over 15,000 school buses on the road in Ontario.
2. More than 800,000 children in Ontario ride school buses every day.
3. The law requires all school buses have safety inspections every 6 months.
4. The most regulated Driver's licence in Ontario is a school bus class licence. It requires a medical; a check for no criminal record; a check for good driving record (less than 6 demerit points) and a MTO approved "Driver Improvement Course".
5. We carry your most precious cargo.

BE COOL! FOLLOW THE RULES

- 1 Be on time.
- 2 Never run to or from the bus.
- 3 Stand back from the curb.
- 4 Don't push or shove.
- 5 Stay in your seat.
- 6 Don't yell or shout.
- 7 Always obey the driver.
- 8 Wait for driver's signal before crossing.
- 9 Always cross at least 3 meters (10 feet) in front of the bus.
- 10 Never crawl under a school bus.
